- Pharmacists can specialize in microbiology as well
- Tons of technology, can make IVs, etc
- Patient care, ambulatory, many different tracks

- Best thing to do besides helping patients is to help mentor the next generation

- A Typical Day in the Life?
 - Very flexible of what happens
 - Twice a week, group case conference, discussing current journals of what is happening (In Infectious Disease Area)
 - Patient clinical activities to help do recommendations to help others
 - Table Rounds: talk about the patients one by one and asks Pharmacists what they recommend
- What is the process of qualifying a patient as an ID patient
 - A specific bacteria needs to be found in the blood, they need to be tested to have a closer look
 - Pharmacists are consultants to recommend medication to patients
